

Happy New Year from the school to all the residents of Hawkesbury.

As I am sure you have all noticed, at long last the ramp is finished and I am sure you will all agree that it looks brilliant and has definitely been worth it. This project has taken 3 years to come to fruition and there are many people who have worked very hard to make it happen. Thank you to all the residents who have put up with the disruption outside school for the past few months.

The children had a busy December celebrating Christmas and raising money for various charities. They held an amazing talent competition in aid of 'Children in Need', led and organised by children from the school council. They raised the very impressive amount of £162.50. The children also made boxes to send to Eastern Europe and Africa for the Samaritans Purse charity, we had a total of 48 boxes, which was a brilliant effort by all.

It was a real success and a great big thank you to the church for letting us use their beautiful building. Both events had collections for 'Children's Hospice South West' and we raised a fantastic grand total of £259.74, thank you to all those who gave so generously.

Robin and Wren class had some real excitement when the fire engine came to visit our school. They were given a talk from two of the firemen about fire safety and what to do in an emergency and then were allowed to explore the fire engine and ask lots of questions.

Swallow class have been studying the topic of Isambard Kingdom Brunel and enjoyed a trip to the SS Great Britain and Bristol Suspension Bridge. They will be continuing this topic next term. The oldest children in Hawk class will be studying traffic in Hawkesbury and comparing it to traffic in Bristol. PC Paul Fortune has agreed that they can use his speed cameras.

Hawkesbury Upton Senior Citizen's Fund

Dear All

Some of the distributors have recently been asked 'What is this fund?' and 'Whom do we thank?' I felt that it was time to include some information in the Parish Magazine.

At the present time the Senior Citizen's Fund is an account that is in place to benefit all those of pension age in the villages of Hawkesbury, Hawkesbury Upton and The Commons. It is distributed annually in December. The Royal British Legion purely administers the fund (ably managed by Fred Trinder for many years). The signatories of the account and therefore 'the committee' are Sam Allen, Tim Davies, Charlie Dix and Liz Howard.

But we need your help to ensure that no one is missed. It is difficult to know when people reach pension age (state pension). If we've missed you out, it's because you look too young! Please let us know when you or someone else reaches that age.

No one knows exactly when the fund was first set-up. From the 19th century the Parish Charities fund distributed food. This consisted of donations of Bread and Sugar. In the 1940s/50s Mr Thompson gave out the Bread in Hawkesbury and Mr Coates in Hillesley.

Those I have spoken with do not remember exactly when it changed. However, a separate fund was started in either late 1950s or early 1960s. As far as I can ascertain, it is thought that Maurice Bezar was involved. He was then a member of the Parish Council. At that time it was felt that people didn't want gifts of food. Donations of money would be more beneficial especially to the Senior Citizens. Therefore a fund was set up to give monies to the Senior Citizens of the community. General fundraising in the community would raise the monies.

The RBL records are since 1966, and in 1968 30/- (30 shillings = to £1.50 today) was paid out to 89 persons. In 2009 ± 10 was paid out to 197 persons.

Over the years a lot of villagers have made individual donations to the fund. It's fascinating to look back at the old records and you may find the following of interest: In the 1960s/70s there were competitions for mushrooms, pumpkin, cucumber, peas and beans. Whilst whist drives, raffles and coffee mornings brought in good amounts. Dosh Allen ran twice-yearly jumble sales between 1976 and 1990 – raising £4,099 in total. The Harvest Home / Auction was (and still is) a regular event at The Beaufort Arms and over the years has raised £4,700. Iris Starling ran Dances from 1972 to 1976 raising a total of £460. Beaufort House used to have regular garden parties and fundraising events and has donated over £2,000. Village organisations have also given generously: Cricket, Darts, Football, Skittles, RAOB (The Buffs), PCC (Parochial Church Council), The RBL and both Pubs.

But....The person who has raised an amazing £11,500 since 1990 is ... Prim Curtis.

She has raised this amount via her annual Garden Party and ongoing collections in the Post Office. Many, many thanks Prim and also to all your valiant helpers.

At the moment the fund is reasonably healthy. But each year we will continue to need fundraising events and donations to enable us to continue with this great tradition - which is what makes Hawkesbury what it is – a caring and sharing community.

WOTTON SCOUTS, CUBS AND BEAVERS EARN ENVIRONMENTAL BADGE WITH GLOUCESTERSHIRE WILDLIFE TRUST

A day of hard graft in blustery weather conditions ended in celebration last Sunday (22 November) when Wotton-under-Edge Beavers, Cubs and Scouts all received their Environmental Partnership badge in recognition of the hard work they have put in assisting Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust in making its new Nind Nature Reserve a better place for wildlife.

In celebration of their Centenary year, over 4 sessions of volunteering the group have 'done their duty' to the community (a key Scouting principle) and made significant progress at the site, repairing bridges, felling small trees, clearing scrub, creating a beetle loggery and an artificial home (or 'holt') for otters. Their work has greatly

enhanced the site for invertebrates, water voles, otters, kingfishers and snipe to use.

The Environment Badges were awarded to the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts by the Scout Group's Honorary President, 86 year old Wilf Chappell. Wilf has been associated with the local Scouts for over 70 years, first joining as a lad himself in 1938. He is also a Trustee of the Scout Group's property 'Conygres' adjacent to the Trust's Old London Road Nature Reserve in Wotton-under-Edge, which the Trust and the Group have been working closely together to develop.

Following the presentations, Mr Chappell commented:



"The Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, their leaders and members of the Trust have achieved some excellent work at the site during 2009. It is good to see the youngsters being occupied outside and learning about and being directly involved in caring for the environment around us."

In recognition of the partnership, Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust staff members, Tom Burditt and John Field, who have managed the project, were also awarded a badge for their efforts!

Nature Reserves Development Manager, Tom Burditt said:

"The youngsters have mastered carpentry skills, tool use and the safe handling of bonfires; and we have even roasted sloes to make them edible. They have also learnt to find and identify a range of wildlife like spawning brown trout banks, scarlet tiger-moths and crayfish, aided by Kathy Meakin from Gloucestershire Naturalists' Society."

John Field, Water Vole Project Officer added:

"Wotton-under-Edge Scout Group have been an enormous help in restoring suitable water vole habitat to what was a heavily overgrown degraded site - The amount of work undertaken during their four sessions has been phenomenal. Tom and I are both looking forward to working with them again next year."

The site was once the old trout farm and is owned by Ben and Anna Read, who are currently working with Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust to maximise its potential as a wildlife haven and nature reserve.

To the Editor of the Mercury and Post

SIR - Will you kindly allow me to insert the following word picture in your excellent and widely read journal? It was on a splendid Sunday evening in the queen month of the year that a beautiful babe was sleeping, laid in a homely cradle in one of the cottage homes of England. The church bell was tolling for evening prayers. A clean, industrious, and pretty young wife was leading the other little children a little way from the cottage to take a little air while baby was sleeping. She was followed by a fine young man - her husband - whom she was entreating to to stay at home with the children and allow her to go to church. That man was going to the public-house, to come home towards midnight stupefied - a practice he had followed for several years past. This scene was witnessed by the writer in a village near Bristol; May 8th, 1881. What a boon the Sunday closing would be to such wives and mothers as these!





Article No. 2 ~ MISSING THE POINT!

It's me again, Jessy Rooster. I feel that I should provide an insight over the coming months into the world of energy. Mine is but one view but comes from over quarter of a century of experience in the energy field.

District Councillor Report

Planning for the Area

Early in February, we will see the publication of the consultation on the Core Strategy, which will replace the Local Plan; this contains all the planning policies which frame all future development in our area. If you are interested in what will happen in the future in our area, it is important that you get involved in this consultation. Work has started and Parish Councils have already been asked to identify recreational and open space land in the parish and take a view on if they think the current facilities are adequate. I have also been asked to comment on the availability of employment land – we have very little in Hawkesbury Parish. I will of course pass on any details when they become available, but they will be published on the South Gloucestershire Council website: www.southglos.gov.uk

Frenchay Future

The future of Frenchay is still under discussion, but it does look increasing like this site will be providing rehabilitation for patients and be a site for extra-care housing. A paper is to be published in January.

The Commons

At a recently held Commons meeting held, rights holders learnt what a Higher Level Scheme would look like and what Natural England would be asking of the graziers. This scheme would provide monies for the land management of the Commons; there was a discussion about how this would be administered. South Gloucestershire Council, who manage the Commons, has agreed to be the applicant to bid for the monies, it is hoped to set up a committee, with parish council involvement, with the membership of those with Commons rights and especially those who turn out cattle as they will be key to the future management. Thanks to Jenny Phelps, who has been working with those involved in turning out. The details of process are yet to be finalised.

Avon Wildlife Trust is carrying out a survey on fields in the area, and will be working with local land owners once they have been identified.

The Hawkesbury School Travel Plan is beginning to take shape, and it is hoped an open session will be held in February. Dates and times are to be advertised.


