

The children have been as busy as ever during the last month. They have shown themselves to be the caring and enterprising individuals that I am sure you recognise. In response to the Haiti earthquake disaster, they responded as the rest of the village did, by organising their own fundraising events. The oldest children researched and produced their own assembly to inform the rest of the school and parents about the natural disaster. The children and parents also kindly donated cakes and unwanted items for a 'Bring and Buy' sale and we also held a non-uniform day. All of their efforts raised a phenomenal £400.

Our Lets Get Cooking Club is almost about to start with Mrs Porter and Mrs James having completed their training. 4 of our children attended a training course at the Winterbourne International Academy, teaching them basic food preparation and hygiene skills which they shall be putting into practice at school.

Some of our Key Stage 2 children have been taking part in a series of cross country races during the winter months with other children from schools in the locality. This is a new sport for Hawkesbury children and one which they have very much enjoyed taking part in. I would like to say well done to all the children who have competed, they tried very hard and got a real sense of achievement from taking part.

The children in Hawk class (the oldest children) have a fantastic opportunity to be part of a concert for all schools in South Gloucestershire. They will be joining with other schools from around the county to learn songs and make music together. The rehearsals that take place over the next few months, culminate in an evening concert held at the Colston Hall.

Thank you so much to those of you who have donated dressing up clothes and material for the children to use at dinner time to dress up in and create dens. We have even had some amazing saris donated which the children will really appreciate. We could still do with more though so if you have any spare clothes, hats or large pieces of material or curtains you don't want any more, please drop them into school where they will be well used – many thanks.

Finally, we will be losing Tristan George this term as his family are relocating to the Netherlands. We would like to take this opportunity to wish his family all the very best and good luck in the future.



WHAT'S ON...NOW WE'LL ALL KNOW

What: The name of the Event

When: Start and End times and dates

Repeat: Is this a weekly/monthly/annual event

Where: Location and address if required

Notes: This can be used to add more detail about the event, how to get there, what to bring, who will be there, bar available etc.

To book the Village Hall nothing has changed, check the Hall calendar to make sure the Hall is free and then e-mail Terry Gardner at bookings@village-hall.org and include the following information:

What: The name of the Event

When: Start and End times and dates

Repeat: Is this a weekly/monthly/annual event

Where: Location and address if required

Notes: This can be used to add more detail about the event, how to get there, what to bring, who will be there, bar available etc.

With just a week to go before I leave my job, my thoughts turn to our household economy. I will have to find ways of saving money.

This thought does not upset me. In fact I am looking forward to the challenge. Ever the optimist, I expect to find an upside to this enforced frugality.

Already I have become addicted to a certain cut-price supermarket whose cheap goods are appealingly exotic. My weekly shop has been transformed into a lightning tour of Europe. It's exciting to pick up a product with ingredients listed in 20 different languages. It's refreshing to see that the manufacturer has not assumed that English is more important than the other. It's a kind of inverse imperialism.

Poring over the supermarket till receipt, I am reminded of a conversation one day with my grandmother. In preparation for my grandfather's retirement, she was planning to make some economies.

"I will use two sheets of lavatory paper instead of three," she confided.

Even then, at the age of 8, I was impressed by the elegant simplicity of this solution. At a stroke, Grandma had sliced a third off her future toilet tissue budget. This logic could be rolled out right across her store cupboard. Sharing a teabag between two mugs instead of using one in each will halve your tea costs. A level teaspoon of sugar instead of a rounded one saves maybe a quarter. Substitute sherbet pips for sherbet lemons – my goodness, on a one-to-or one basis, you are talking about an 80% cut at least. She was really onto something.

I am therefore ready to embrace this economy business wholeheartedly. At least, until my husband emerges from the bathroom that I've just stocked with multilingual-labelled toilet paper (10 rolls for £1, what a bargain!)

"I hope you're not economising on toilet paper?" he pleads, a pained look on his face. And I haven't even told him yet that he's only allowed two sheets.

Knitting pattern

You can use almost any wool. Choose your needles to match.

Cast on 2 stitches

Row 1: make one (knit into the front and back of the stitch, m1), knit (k) to last stitch, m1

Row 2: purl (p) 1 row

Repeat these two rows 6 times total until you have 14 stitches

Knit two together (k2tog), k5 and turn leaving 7 stitches on the needle
p2tog, p2, p2tog

Cast off 4 stitches, cut a long piece of yarn (about 10 inches) and weave through back of piece to reattach to other side (where you left off when turning)

k5, k2tog

p2tog, p2, p2tog

Cast off 4 stitches

Repeat the above pattern for the opposite side of the heart. Sew the two sides together, turn inside out and fill with old yarn.



The Big Stitch

It's such a simple thing to do, getting sponsored to knit as many of these fantastic little hearts as you can. The money you raise will help The Children's Society to work with more children facing abuse, neglect and poverty in their daily lives - building the foundations of a good childhood with these children and their families.

Raise money by being sponsored to knit. You could also sell them to your friends and family to raise even more, or give them away as gifts. Labels are available to tie to your hearts to tell people they were knitted with love to help disadvantaged children in the UK.

“Robin Hood – an Historical Perspective”

“Robyn hode in scherewode stod”

or DID HE?

Was Sherwood Forest his base or Barnsdale Forest, near Doncaster? Today Nottinghamshire & South Yorkshire both lay claim to our National Hero BUT was he real or was he a myth? The oldest references to the name occur in the late 13th C records of itinerant judges who travelled from county to county trying criminal cases and there are examples of ‘Robehods’ and ‘Rabunhods’ from all over the country. Here the name would seem to have been used as a shorthand or nick-name for any fugitive or outlaw. On the other hand, exploits of our hero begin to feature in the many songs and stories of the 15th century (the earliest surviving text of a narrative ballad about him, held by Cambridge University, dates to the 1450s). Portrayed as a highly skilled archer and marksman “*he was a gode outlawe, and did pore men moch gode*”.



Tony Harcourt’s talk will explore the myth of Robin Hood and the evidence for his being real or fictional. WE MIGHT HAVE TO DECIDE WHICH! He will also look at the lives of ordinary people in medieval times and the laws they lived under and will bring along examples of the English longbow and arrows.

HAWKESBURY LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY - A PROFILE AND HISTORY

We've come a long way since 1998 when 'young' Barrie Hope had an idea which, in the congenial surroundings of Pat & Peter Sherry's Ruby Wedding celebrations in September of that year, he shared with others and was met with enthusiasm. Why not let's start a local history society? Initial meetings to discuss the possibility attracted a considerable number of people and it wasn't long before an informal 'committee' had been formed with Barrie as chairman (a position he still holds today). What sort of things should we do? Talks - probably, outings - perhaps, research projects - possibly, collecting as much information about the area in the past - without a doubt. The name needed to reflect the very large original manor given to the Abbey of Pershore in the 10th century which then included Didmarton and Oldbury on the Hill as well as Badminton, Tresham, Kilcott, Saddlewood, Hillesley, Upton and 'Sud Stoce' or South Stoke. Upton obviously became the large village of Hawkesbury Upton but where on earth was South Stoke? It was the 'command centre' of the manor around St Mary's church, which extended to the boundary with Horton and included both Hawkesbury and Inglestone Commons and the northern part of Lower Woods. It was no use calling ourselves the 'Sud Stoce Local History Society' (Stoke Giffard? Bradley Stoke? Stoke on Trent?), and so, using the Domesday entry as a guide (where the name is spelt 'havochesberie') we became simply "Hawkesbury Local History Society". The membership fee in 1999 was fixed at £5 for an individual, £7.50 for a couple and as Peter Sherry our treasurer reminds us, it's still the same eleven years on!

Since January 1999 our 'meetings organisers' (first Jennifer Oldershaw then Rebecca Ireland and now Neil Fozard) have arranged no fewer than 106 talks on a wide range of subjects. The English Bowmen, The History of Acton Court, Isambard Kingdom Brunel, Bristol Aeroplane Company, Medieval & Tudor Gardens, A History of Beds, The Bristol Blitz, Edward Jenner, The History of the Christmas Card, Moated Sites, The History of Fry's Chocolate Factory, A Day Trip to Severn Beach, The History of Lower Woods, Where Did You Get That Surname?, Bristol by Tram, Electrical Appliances of Yesteryear, The Pastons of Horton, My Life with Shire Horses, The Lower Woods Roman Villa, Bristol Pirates & Privateers, are just a few of the very varied titles we've offered. We've also had some wonderful demonstrations: Cheese making, Dyeing with Woad, Clothes of the 18th Century, Tools of Country Trades, and the memorable 'Magic Lantern Shows' of the Elsbury's. Don Watts has led walks around old Hawkesbury countryside, we walked round the village with architectural historian Linda Hall, Mike Martin has taken us 'to the woods', we've visited Chavenage House, Badminton House, Frampton Court as well as Acton Court, and planned for this year are visits to Frampton Manor (Thursday 17th June) and Wickwar Brewery (Thursday 16th September). We hope to offer more 'visits' further afield in future (including Windsor Castle), and more local walks.

Initially one of our main aims was to collect as much information as possible about work already carried out on the history of the Hawkesbury area and to add to it from our own reading and searches. As a result, as the years have gone by, we have accumulated a large archive of material (including books, pamphlets, old post-cards & maps) now stored at Pool Farm House, together with a computer-store of transcripts of original documents gathered from all over the country. Gloucestershire Archives is well known territory for some of us, The National Archives too, but less well known is the fact that many original Hawkesbury documents are kept at Lewes in the East Sussex Record Office. Having amassed such a large amount of material about Hawkesbury we were spurred on to 'do something with it'. The first step was to produce an introductory leaflet in 2001 explaining some of the basic history to accompany a walk with points of interest. This was followed by the publication in March 2008 of the much acclaimed "Hawkesbury Chronicles 972-1899AD" containing a wealth of historical detail but which is merely the 'tip of the iceberg'. "A History of Lower Woods Part I: The Names", by Jill & Mike Martin was published by the society, in conjunction with Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust, in September 2008. Both books are still available (phone Barrie Hope 01454 238673).

Members' interests are wide-ranging from field walking & archaeology to graveyards & church history, woodland history & common rights, village families & the history of more recent times and collecting old books, newspaper articles & old photographs. As well as our monthly talks (usually the 3rd Friday of the month) which we aim to advertise in the parish newsletter and on posters, we hold very informal 'get togethers' on the first Wednesday evening of the month at Pool Farm House. Over a glass (or two) of wine or a cup of coffee we chat about all sorts of things historical. We might want to look at some of the maps, tell everyone about a recent visit to Gloucestershire Archives, pool ideas for interesting speakers, discuss projects or even our next venture into publishing and there's seldom a month goes by when Don doesn't arrive with a tray of 'finds' such as flints (he's got an expert eye for spotting arrow heads) and potsherds found when walking the dogs! There'd be a very warm welcome if you'd like to come along to a 'Wednesday evening'. Perhaps you'd like to search the ar-

chive, have a query answered, show us some old photos or property deeds or just come and talk about Hawkesbury 'in the old days'.

We'd like to enlist help for further projects: would you be interested in helping to transcribe the wills left by Hawkesbury folk (there are 79 at The National Archives dating from 1548 to 1851 and no fewer than 631 at Gloucester)? That's an enormous task but it could be done gradually and would give us an insight into the possessions and lives of ordinary local people. Perhaps you'd like to help with a survey of old wells? Many are marked on old editions of maps but have since disappeared (did you know that behind the old Blue Boy house, and now built over, there was once a well 90 feet deep?). May be you'd like to try 'field walking'? There are all sorts of things we might be able to do with your help including the production of a booklet about the interiors of houses in the Hawkesbury area. Has your home got any interesting features such as fireplace, door knocker, door handles, window catches, old cupboards, sinks & taps, WC pan, staircase newel posts, shaped beams etc.? We might include garden features too (are there any earth closets left?). We'd aim to collect photographs (either sent by yourselves or we could come along and take photos) and perhaps convert these into line drawings for the booklet. Even if you're not sure whether your house has anything 'special' do get in touch.

Why not come along to our next talk (Friday March 19th) when Robin Hood is to be the subject and in April (16th) when Dawn Dyer will give us an insight into the lives of Bristol Suffragettes? Everyone is welcome (non-members pay £2, and members £1) and there's opportunity for 'catching up' with friends when we break in the middle for tea or coffee. Finally, mark your diaries/calendars for SATURDAY MAY 22nd when we're staging an important event in the village hall. Called "Map Day" it's actually going to be "Map Afternoon" from 2.00-5.00pm but we'll need the morning to set out our very large collection of maps of all types, sizes, ages and areas. There'll be something of interest for everyone and, we hope to be able to offer copies of some.

Mugabe and the White African

District Councillor Report

Council Tax

People in South Gloucestershire Council will see an increase of 2.5% in their council tax for 2010/11. The Council agreed a budget of around £190 million.

Extra monies had to be found for safeguarding vulnerable children, and maintaining the concessionary fares scheme. £400,000 has been brought forward from this budget for immediate spending on the potholes and re-surfacing the roads after the winter weather. The Council has made it easier to report potholes by introducing a link from the front page of the website www.southglos.gov.uk

Have you visited your local library?

Yate Library has recently been extended and refurbished and opened by local poet John Hegley. As well as providing more space, there are rooms for hire, and a larger range of books, films, music and games to borrow. There is free WiFi access and new self service facilities. The library is open daily apart from Wednesdays. Don't forget that the mobile library visits the village fortnightly (8th & 22nd March) 2.35 pm in the Village Hall Car Park; 3.05 pm on The Plain and 3.25 pm in Highfields.

Frenchay Hospital

A report – The Emerging Themes – was presented at the recent Health Scrutiny Committee. The future for Frenchay appears to be a Health & Social Care Centre, which includes a community hospital with a range of out-patient and diagnostic services, with a strong focus on rehabilitation. There will also be a centre for non-NHS services providing health and care services. The site also has the potential for the development of Extra Care Housing, offering a high level of support and a registered care home. This will be brought about by the closer working of Health Trusts and Council Social Services.

The decision has been made to close Council owned residential care homes, with those in Yate being the first to close. There is to be greater emphasis on keeping older people in their own homes. Extra Care housing is currently being developed in North Yate.

HomeChoice

There has been a change in how people apply for what used to be called 'Council Housing'. Anyone wishing to be considered for housing, which includes bungalows must be registered with HomeChoice lettings, which will identify your needs. Much of this can be done on internet, however lists of available property, which includes private as well as Housing Association properties will be mailed weekly to those interested and not advertised in the local press, which was previously the case. The time for response has been limited to one week, and applicants will only be allowed three refusals.

Hawkesbury Upton does have social housing (19 properties) which is limited in the first instance to those with a strong local connection, but you must be registered with HomeChoice letting to qualify. The bungalows in Highfields are not covered by this limitation.

Registered Common holders and graziers

The School Hall has been booked for a meeting of registered Common holders and graziers on the 11th March at 7.00pm. This will be an update on the application for Higher Level Stewardship for the Commons.
